Cindy: Discussion Part 1

Three Types of Silence

In his fantasy novel, The Name of the Wind, Patrick Rothfuss beautifully describes three types of silence near the beginning of the novel. Here is an excerpt. See if you can discern the different types of silence he describes.

PROLOGUE A Silence of Three Parts

IT WAS NIGHT AGAIN. The Waystone Inn lay in silence, and it was a silence of three parts. The most obvious part was a hollow, echoing quiet, made by things that were lacking. If there had been a wind it would have sighed through the trees, set the inn's sign creaking on its hooks, and brushed

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the silence down the road like trailing autumn leaves. If there had been a crowd, even a handful of men inside the inn, they would have filled the silence with conversation and laughter, the clatter and clamor one expects from a drinking house during the dark hours of night. If there had been music . . . but no, of course there was no music. In fact there were none of these things, and so the silence remained. Inside the Waystone a pair of men huddled at one corner of the bar. They drank with quiet determination, avoiding serious discussions of troubling news. In doing this they added a small, sullen silence to the larger, hollow one. It made an alloy of sorts, a counterpoint. The third silence was not an easy thing to notice. If you listened for an hour, you might begin to feel it in the wooden floor underfoot and in the rough, splintering barrels behind the bar. It was in the weight of the black stone hearth that held the heat of a long dead fire. It was in the slow back and forth of a white linen cloth rubbing along the grain of the bar. And it was in the hands of the man who stood there, polishing a stretch of mahogany that already gleamed in the lamplight.

The man had true-red hair, red as flame. His eyes were dark and distant, and he moved with the subtle certainty that comes from knowing many things. The Waystone was his, just as the third silence was his. This was appropriate, as it was the greatest silence of the three, wrapping the others inside itself. It was deep and wide as autumn's ending. It was heavy as a great river-smooth stone. It was the patient, cut-flower sound of a man who is waiting to die.

- 1. What did you notice? What would you call any of these types of silence he described?
- 2. (These types are: the hollow silence, the expectant silence, and the awkward silence.)
- 3. Think of this sanctuary, now or in a time past, are there any types of silence you have experienced? How would you describe them?
- 4. What about in other places? And what purposes might these silences serve?

Nature by Emerson

In Transcendentalism, transcendence refers to the idea that individuals can go beyond the limitations of the physical world and experience a higher realm of spiritual truth and understanding. This realm is accessed not through logic or sensory experience, but through intuition and a connection with nature and the divine.

Here is an excerpt from Ralph Waldo Emerson's 1836 essay, Nature.

"Standing on the bare ground—my head bathed by the blithe air, and uplifted into infinite space—all mean egotism vanishes. I become a transparent eyeball. I am nothing. I see all. The currents of the Universal Being circulate through me; I am part or particle of God."

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He also says:

"The sun illuminates only the eye of the man, but shines into the eye and the heart of the child. The lover of nature is he whose inward and outward senses are still truly adjusted to each other; who has retained the spirit of infancy even into the era of manhood."

Questions - Emerson

- 1. What does he mean when he says, "I become a transparent eyeball. I am nothing. I see all."?
- 2. What does this have to do with silence?

Discussion - Part 2

Holy Bible

The book of James in the Bible focuses on practical Christian living and the importance of putting faith into action. It emphasizes that true faith is demonstrated through works and obedience to God's word, not just belief.

James 1:19 says: "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry." This New Testament teaching emphasizes listening over hasty speech.

James 3:1-12 says: "Not many of you should become teachers, my fellow believers, because you know that we who teach will be judged more strictly. 2 We all stumble in many ways. Anyone who is never at fault in what they say is perfect, able to keep their whole body in check.

3 When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. 4 Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are

steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go. 5 Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. 6 The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole body, sets the whole course of one's life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell.

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7 All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles and sea creatures are being tamed and have been tamed by mankind, 8 but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison.

9 With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. 10 Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be. 11 Can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring? 12 My brothers and sisters, can a fig tree bear olives, or a grapevine bear figs? Neither can a salt spring produce fresh water."

Questions - James

- 1. What does it mean to tame the tongue?
- 2. Answer the question can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring?
- 3. How does pausing before speaking affect our ability to discern what is possible?

Rumi

"The Guest House" by Rumi (Inspired by Hinduism and Sufism)

(translated by Coleman Barks, selected for its lyrical quality):

This being human is a guest house. Every morning a new arrival. A joy, a depression, a meanness, some momentary awareness comes as an unexpected visitor. Welcome and entertain them all! Even if they're a crowd of sorrows, who violently sweep your house empty of its furniture, still, treat each guest honorably. He may be clearing you out for some new delight. The dark thought, the shame, the malice, meet them at the door laughing, and invite them in. Be grateful for whoever comes, because each has been sent as a guide from beyond.

- 2. How is it about noise?
